## SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Spring has finally Sprung! After a long weary winter, we finally have welcoming temperatures and will soon see flowers blooming, and trees will be budding, and the Missouri Ozarks' beauty will be fully displayed. Springtime weather patterns also increase the risk of violent and severe thunderstorms.

I wanted to remind you that the school district has a Community Tornado Safe Room for use during tornado and dangerous high wind events. The Safe Room is on the Morgan County R-I School District Stover School campus at 701 N. Oak St., Stover, MO 65078. The Tornado Safe Room is available to students and residents in the community that do not have adequate safe areas to shelter during severe weather.

Due to the estimated time necessary to reach the Safe Room after a warning has been given, it is absolutely necessary that residents living more than five minutes away come to the Dome before the tornado sirens sound. Once the tornado sirens have been activated, law enforcement and safe room managers will determine when the safe room doors will be locked. Anyone not in the safe room will be sent to a secondary location.

In order to receive a text alert that the Safe room is open, you must sign up through Morgan County Emergency Management (<http://www.morgan-county.org/offices/morgan-county-911/weather-alerts/>) or Morgan County R-1 School district will send out a text message (<https://www.mycallnow.com/Home/CreateAccount?type=0>) indicating the safe room is open. If you do not have a text message device, you can receive a traditional phone call by calling or stopping by Morgan County R-1 School District.

## **ANNUAL PERFORMANCE REPORT (REPORT CARD):**

Even with all the COVID happenings of the past few years, the Missouri Department of Education was required by law to implement a new rigorous REPORT CARD for all Missouri Public and Charter Schools. This report card is being phased in starting in the 2022-2023 school year and is using data from the 2021-22 school year. One MAJOR change from the previous report card is that Achievement Scores and Achievement Growth have been separated which has really impacted overall scores. As a result, you can be a high academic achieving school district but lose points because achievement scores didn't show enough growth. In other words, a higher achieving school district can be lower rated than an under-achieving school district because the other school district showed more growth. Regardless, this is the new system that we will have to adjust to. So how did Morgan County R-1 perform on the 22-23 Report Card?

As you can see, our 'Report Card' Score is very similar to conference and area schools. Are we satisfied? No! The students, teachers, staff, administrators, and Board of Education will continue to do what is necessary to be #1.

### **Enrollment increases=Classroom expansion**

On many occasions, I have written about our increased enrollment. In the past nine years, our Kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup>-grade enrollment has increased by 208 students, translating to over a 36% increase! This does not include the 54 Preschool students that attend our full-day PK programs. It should also be noted that we have a lengthy waitlist for our preschool program. So, we have over

840 students on campus on any given school day. Every available space is being utilized to provide services for our students. As a result of our growth and early childhood needs, the district will be embarking on a facility project that will include the construction of new elementary classrooms, bathroom renovations, and a new bus barn. We believe this project will meet our current needs and the flexibility to possibly look at a larger building project in the future.

**Energy Saving projects are also on the horizon.**

With energy costs escalating, we plan on making some improvements to keep our cost down. One area with the most significant need is in our kitchen. We plan to eliminate the three walk-in freezers and one walk-in refrigerator and go to one larger unit accessible inside the building. Another area we want to improve is the H.S. Gym/Cafeteria. We want to install new windows, doors, and awnings to insulate this area better. The last area we plan to improve would be installing solar on the Elementary Gym. In recent years we have replaced older Natural Gas HVAC systems with electric VRF systems, which has increased electric costs. Recent legislation and increased electricity costs have improved the cost-to-benefit ratio for school districts to use solar. It is estimated that we would save between 20-30% on energy costs, which would more than pay for the panels in a short period of time. In addition, we are also planning on installing some charging stations as more EV cars and buses become common.

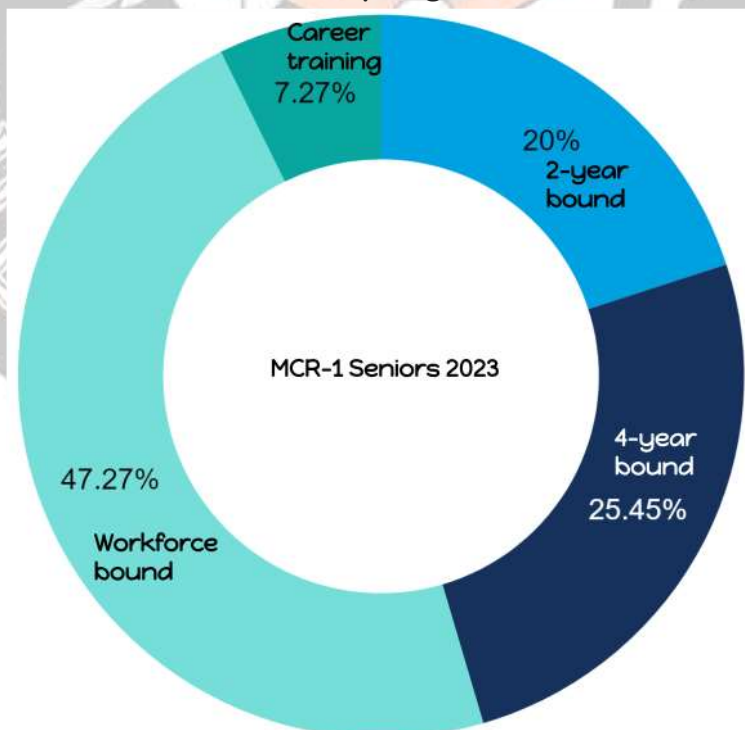
## rootEd Advising-Planning for the Future

## Counselor's Corner

My name is Raven Eckhoff, and I started in the position of Jr High/High School Responsive Services Provider Position this past November 2022. I provide consultation and support services to staff and students, crisis counseling, referrals for ongoing therapy, and assessment of needs. I am a Licensed Professional Counselor and have been providing therapy for the past seven years. I specialize in trauma therapy, enjoy working with youth, and am always amazed by their strengths and resiliency. A day into my world consists of meeting with students on a need-to-need basis providing basic needs and intermittent counseling as they may be struggling with peer conflict, anxiety, mood management, poor academic performance, and sometimes trauma/crises. I also have meetings with staff to assess needs, discuss providing optimal care and explore ways to ensure students' academic success and mental health support.

Upcoming dates: Over the next couple of months: March 27-30 and May 1-4<sup>th</sup>, with the help of Ashley Witte, a Community Outreach and Education Coordinator with ChildSafe of Central Missouri, I will be providing prevention education to 6-12<sup>th</sup> grade students that discuss child safety encompassing victimization of sexual abuse and sexual exploitation. The State of Missouri mandates this training to ensure optimal safety for our students. Education is vital, especially at a young age, due to ever-increasing victimization statistics among young adolescents. As we continue to learn, education does not take away innocence. Still, instead, experiences do, and with prevention education, we intend to empower students to ensure their own safety and the safety of others. The education will provide information on "prevent, recognize and respond appropriately to bullying, cyberbullying, the four types of abuse (physical, emotional, sexual, neglect), digital abuse, and other digital dangers."
