

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Spring has Sprung:

Spring has finally Sprung! After a long, weary winter, we are finally experiencing welcoming temperatures. Soon, flowers will bloom, trees will bud, and the Missouri Ozarks' beauty will be fully displayed. Springtime is a busy time in the school world. Many sports, music programs, and awards assemblies will keep everyone busy until the last day of school on May 10. Here are some items that could be of interest to you.

Summer School:

At this time we are planning on having summer school this year. We could not have summer school last year because of all the bathroom remodels.

This year, we will have our traditional summer school from 8:00 am until 1:00 pm. The summer school will be four days a week, starting May 13 and ending May 31. We will have summer bus routes, which are similar to what we have with our after-school BEAT program. We also hope to conduct youth sports clinics after 1:00 pm on summer school dates. We will be sending more information regarding summer school very shortly.

Football:

We recently had an informational meeting regarding the possibility of the district starting a football program in the future. During the past several years, we have surveyed students and parents regarding the possibility of adding Football as a sport offered at Morgan County R-1. Our enrollment has resulted in increased interest in football. Several years ago, we were able to CO-OP junior high football at Cole Camp, and last year, we had discussions with a neighboring district about CO-OP football. While CO-OP would be a great way to start a program, it also has some significant drawbacks related to MSHSAA's sports classification.

In addition to survey data, we discussed the extreme need for a greater level of parent participation if we were to start a football program. School districts with football programs typically participate actively and highly from parent-led booster clubs. Parents are tasked with fundraising, coaching youth teams, having pregame meals, and assisting at the games by working concessions or being on the chain crew. We currently have a dedicated Booster club of around 4-5 people. However, our elementary PTO has a much larger group, which gives us hope for the future.

The need for a large and active booster club becomes more evident regarding the cost of maintaining a football program. School districts can expect to spend between \$40,000 to \$60,000 annually to support a football program. The cost of helmets, shoulder pads, and all the other safety and training equipment is much greater than that of our different sports programs. This is compounded at MCR-1 because we need track, baseball, or softball facilities in town or school. A football facility would require a new field, practice field, bleachers, concessions, restrooms, and locker rooms. It would be hard to start a football program unless we commit to getting facilities for all our programs.

A common, summarizing question I was frequently asked at the informational meeting was, 'Do you really think Stover will get football?' My answer is Yes!, but only if we can get the students, parents, and community to commit to building and maintaining a program. We will have another meeting shortly to set goals to make a football program a reality. Stay tuned!

Construction Update:

If you have driven by the school, you've noticed much progress in the elementary addition. Once completed, the addition will allow for six additional elementary classrooms, which will help free up space. We should see the outside bricks finished and the roof system installed shortly. I appreciate everyone's grace and patience with the closing of 7th Street. Sometimes progress is inconvenient, but the result will allow for much-needed space, a great PK playground, and a safe sidewalk along 7th Street.

Tornado Safe Room:

Springtime weather patterns also increase the risk of violent and severe thunderstorms. The school district has a Community Tornado Safe Room for use during tornadoes and dangerous high-wind events. The Safe Room is on the Morgan County R-I School District Stover School campus at 701 N. Oak St., Stover, MO 65078. Students and residents who need adequate shelter during severe weather can use it.

Due to the estimated time it takes to reach the Safe Room after a warning has been given, residents living more than five minutes away must come to the Dome before the tornado sirens sound. Once the tornado sirens have been activated, law enforcement and safe room managers will determine when the safe room doors will be locked. Anyone not in the safe room will be sent to a secondary location.

To receive a text alert that the Safe room is open, you will need to sign up through Morgan County Emergency Management (<http://www.morgan-county.org/offices/morgan-county-911/weather-alerts/>)or Morgan County R-1 School district will send out a text message(<https://www.mycallnow.com/Home/CreateAccount?type=0>) indicating the safe room is open. If you do not have a text message device, you can receive a traditional phone call by calling or stopping by Morgan County R-1 School District.

I hope everyone has a great ending to their 2023-24 school year. There is so much going on at school that it is nearly impossible to keep up with everything. I appreciate all the support you give us, and as always, Be the #1 in MCR-1.

The State FFA Degree

The State FFA Degree in Missouri is one of the highest awards an FFA member can receive at the state level. **This year's recipients from the Stover FFA Chapter are Brandon Ferguson and Saydi Hagedorn.** They join 17 other Stover FFA members who have achieved this award since the chapter was chartered in the 2008-2009 school year.

This award is a challenging one to receive. It begins with the student's FFA membership and Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) program. Each agricultural education student must have an SAE and keep track of it in their

record book. SAEs can be as simple as working for a local ag-related business or as complex as managing their own cattle herd. Brandon's SAEs involve working on the family farm and at Classics Diner in Cole Camp. Saydi's SAE consists of working on the family farm and raising and showing cattle. These FFA members have also actively attended activities and leadership conferences at the Chapter, Area, District, State, and National levels. They have over 80 hours of community service between the two.

The record book lets students track their inventories, hours worked, and money earned/invested in their projects. It also allows students to keep track of their FFA activities and awards. The State Degree application is completed using the information in their record books from the financial side of the SAE and their involvement in FFA.

Each year, only 10% of the local chapter membership is eligible to apply, and only up to 3% of the state membership can be selected. On top of that, FFA members must also meet the following criteria to be eligible:

1. Have received the Chapter FFA Degree and have been an active FFA member for at least two years (24 months) at the time of receiving the State FFA Degree.
2. While in high school, have completed the equivalent of at least two years (360 hours) of systematic school instruction in agriculture education at or above the ninth-grade level, which includes a supervised agricultural experience program.
3. Have earned and productively invested at least \$1000 or worked at least 300 hours over scheduled class time or a combination thereof in a supervised agricultural experience program.
4. Demonstrate leadership ability by A. Performing ten parliamentary procedures of parliamentary law. B. Give a six-minute speech on a topic related to agriculture or the FFA. C. Serving as an officer and committee chairperson or a participating member of a chapter committee. D. Making a satisfactory score on a written test on FFA.
5. Show outstanding leadership participation in chapter, school, and community activities by A. Participating in planning and conducting the chapter program of activities. B. Serving as a chapter officer or committee chairperson. C. Participating in at least five activities above the chapter level. D. Participating in leadership positions outside the FFA. E. Meeting the minimum FFA Point Score stated in the State Degree Handbook.
6. Have a satisfactory scholastic record certified by the local superintendent or principal.

7. Have participated in at least 25 hours of community service within at least two community service activities. The hours are in addition to and cannot be duplicated as paid or unpaid SAE hours.
8. The Missouri Association shall be entitled to elect at least ten members to the State FFA Degree annually. Where State Membership exceeds 500, a number over ten, but not more than three percent of the State membership may be elected, fractions counted to the nearest whole number. The regional executive committee shall submit written records of achievement verified by the local advisor to the State Advisor at least one month before the State convention. The State Advisor shall review the documents, prepare briefs, and submit his recommendations to the State Executive Committee. This committee will nominate candidates most worthy of the honor at the regular State Convention. The convention delegates shall then elect the candidates most deserving of the State FFA Degree.

FFA and Agricultural Education aren't just about sows, cows, and plows. The National FFA Organization has evolved since it was founded in 1928 in Kansas City, Missouri, as a Vocational Organization for farm boys. While the roots are in agriculture, the goal is career education and to help students become successful leaders with a knowledge of financial accountability. The FFA motto is "Learning to Do, Doing to Learn, Earning to Live, Living to Serve," we strive to make that a big part of our Agricultural Education program at Morgan County R-I.

Parker Herrelson Selected to Participate in Pilot Program

In 2022, Governor Parson of Missouri enacted the Missouri Holocaust Education and Awareness Commission Act, which mandates Holocaust education in the state's schools. Scheduled to take effect for the 2024/2025 school year, the act is currently undergoing implementation through a pilot program involving 23 educators across various districts in Missouri. These educators are teaching the revised Missouri Holocaust Curriculum framework.

Furthermore, the Missouri Holocaust Commission, in collaboration with the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, organized a workshop from February 28th to March 1st, attended by 26 educators from across the state. Among them was Parker Herrelson, a 6th-grade social studies teacher, who secured a spot in the workshop. Over three days in Columbia, she gained invaluable experience, knowledge, and resources to enhance teaching practices within MCR1.

Governor Mike Parson designated the second week of April as "Holocaust Education Week," coinciding with introducing the new curriculum. This mandate extends to all grades 6-12. Ms. Herrelson had the privilege of attending presentations by esteemed experts in the field, including Helen Turner, Director of Education at the Kaplan Feldman Holocaust Museum St. Louis, and Jessica Rockhold, Executive Director of the Midwest Center for Holocaust Education. Additionally, she actively engaged in various classroom activities and acquired access to essential resources, which will facilitate teaching this challenging subject matter to our students.

We eagerly anticipate utilizing these newfound resources in the classroom, fostering a deeper understanding of Holocaust history and its implications.
